Parish Liaison:

are members who are willing to step forward and say 'yes, I can do that'. You will not be alone, you can always request help from other trustees as needed. You can also pick a partner and work together in the position. It is more interesting and fun working with someone else. If critical positions are not filled, I'm not sure our club can carry on our mission. We need to work actively promoting vocations: *Remember without a priest there is no Eucharist!*

Positions that are open:

VP for Vocations: responsible for dispersing vocational information to parishes in our club and other vocational efforts. The vocational information is handed down to the clubs via USA Council. Information is sent out by email to the club VP for Vocations; example is World Day of Prayer for Vocations. Information sent out may include a bulletin insert, information to be used in children education, and an outline for a Homily. The decision is made by the priest of that parish if he wants to use the information. The VP for Vocations would

gather info and give to Parish Liaisons who would disperse to the assigned parishes. (We need Parish Liaisons –read below) Club needs some **Parish Liaison** volunteers (need at least 5). Maybe they can work as the previous Liaisons. The job description is simple and can be very rewarding. You should get to know the pastor and his parish assistant of that particular parish or parishes – you may need to take on two parishes. You need to discuss with them what you would like to do. When the VP for Vocations has vocation related articles at certain times of the year, you would contact that pastor and/or assistant with the information inquiring if they want to use it in their parish, whether it is appropriate for the youth group or the whole parish. It is their decision if they want to use it. You may forward articles via email or deliver in person. Deacon George Thierjung from St Francis of Assisi has volunteered to receive the info for his parish. You can do it also. No need to attend Board Meetings unless you want to do so. In a small way you will actively promoting vocations.

VP for Communications: you would communicate a short synopsis of the events that took place at the club meetings, the important upcoming events the members should be aware off. The upcoming birthdays and anniversaries of the members, religious and seminarians. (You'll get help with the dates, etc). The Newsletter usually goes out end of the month, so you have the date/time for the following month.

Recent Past Events

March 5 - Club Meeting

At the Boulder County Serra Club Zoom meeting of March 5, attending Serra club members were presented with a thought-provoking video lecture by Dr. Randall Smith, archaeologist and bible professor as well as international director of Christian Travel Study Programs (CTSP).

Dr. Smith takes his listeners through Psalm 23 and the analogy of God, the loving and caring shepherd to His people and the shepherds tending their flocks in the land of Israel. While living in Israel, Dr. Smith took two weeks to camp in the hills with the shepherds and their sheep and to observe and learn the relationship between the shepherds and their herds to

understand the full meaning of Christ's Psalm 23.

When the shepherd is out in the desert with his flock and it is daylight when everything is safe and visible, he lets his sheep roam about. However, when darkness begins to settle, he moves closer to be amongst them, to watch over and protect them. So it is with God and his people. As we wander into the dark valley, God is with us, to comfort and speak truth, to show us the way. Jesus said He would leave the 99 to go after the one. When you are feeling alone, that is when he is searching just for you.

To get sheep to lie down at night for rest is a major hurdle for shepherds. The shepherd knows the sheep must have four things, and he provides them. "The Lord is my shepherd, I shall not want." The shepherd makes sure that the sheep are fed. He tickles their stomachs to ensure they are full. He checks to make sure their mouths are wet. If not, he retrieves water from the wineskins and forces it down their throats. He cleans their noses of parasites and their throats of leeches. "He maketh me to lie down in green pastures."

Sheep will not lie down if they feel unsafe. They are very afraid of running water as the weight of their wool will drag them down and cause them to drown. "He leadeth me beside the still waters." Sheep frighten easily. If a stranger enters their midst when they are lying down and vulnerable, they will rise immediately and prepare to run. They trust only the shepherd and will follow his lead. "He leadeth me in the paths of righteousness."

The shepherd must constantly move his sheep to new grazing areas in order to keep them busy forging for food and to keep them from becoming bored and biting each other. "Thou preparest a table before me in the presence of mine enemies."

The shepherd has a relationship with his sheep. He loves them and, therefore, is diligent in his care for them. "Surely goodness and mercy shall follow me all the days of my life; and I will dwell in the house of the Lord forever."

Dr. Smith's talk brought light to Psalm 23. The comparisons of shepherd to sheep and God to His people were very insightful. Once again, Boulder County Serra attendees were availed by words which give us food for thought.

March 19 - Club Meeting

Once again, Boulder County Serra club members attended our second monthly meeting via Zoom, and once again, we were blessed with an outstanding program.

Our March 19 meeting featured two speakers: Fr. Daniel Ciucci, parochial vicar of St. John the Baptist Church in Longmont and longtime parishioner, Aljus Kakoonis.

Fr. Dan began by telling us that during the Lenten season is a time that he likes to think of as "confession palooza" when confessions are offered frequently in preparation for Holy Week and Easter. Fr. Dan admitted to almost badgering his flock to go to confession as "it is such a beautiful

thing". Therefore, when a parishioner such as Mr. Kakoonis decides to return to confession after an absence of 50 years, it is a joyous occasion. The generosity of Mr. Kakoonis in his willingness to share the experience of emotions in undertaking this decision were appreciated by all Serrans in attendance.

Mr. Kakoonis revealed that he began to think about and desire a return to the sacraments that he had known and experienced in his youth. He knew that our "sins are forgiven" with confession, and he wanted back "into the swing of things" in his faith. Mr. Kakoonis also recalled an incident from high school when the priest had told the class about a man who had returned to confession after an absence of 35 years. He thought, with shame, well, I certainly beat that record.

When Fr. Dan inquired, "What was it like for you to come back to confession?", Mr. Kakoonis replied that he was very anxious, that it was very frightening to come back. He was particularly fearful because so much happened during that length of time. He had been married but it had been a civil ceremony and, therefore, God had never approved or witnessed the union. By giving up confession, he gave up his opportunity to receive other sacraments.

Fr. Dan asked, "What was it like preparing for confession after all that time?" Mr. Kakoonis responded, "pretty frightening". He thought he might have to spend a week in penance. Worse case scenario; he thought he might not be forgiven. Mr. Kakoonis added that doubting God was "a silly thing". He said if you ask for forgiveness, it will be given, and God is all

knowing and all forgiving. He told us to go and sin no more. Crossing that bridge, for me, makes it easier to go to bed at night.

Fr. Dan propounded that we all fear rejection; that opening yourself up to another person (in the case of confession, the priest), allowing yourself to be known and then having to face the possibility that the person, after knowing you, may not love you. Mr. Kakoonis added, that one of the things that plays in your heart having been away and done things against God, that God might not forgive me. But, you eventually take the chance that he will – that's faith!

Fr. Dan asked, "Were there other themes that got you to go to confession?"

Mr. Kakoonis said that it helped that Fr. Dan encouraged his return by telling him to just start coming up to communion even though you cannot receive. Mr. Kakoonis was worried people would question why he was coming up to the altar but he did it anyway. Then, he increased his prayers, began reading the Bible and saying the rosary. He finally overcame his fear of rejection by Father and his own self-rejection. His family is thrilled, and he is at peace!

Fr. Dan said his mission is to pastor people towards Jesus. As a priest, he feels "fatherly pride" in those who come to confession. "Not going to confession is like not breathing."

Mr. Kakoonis says, "you better be prepared in life for death, and what can happen if you aren't."

MONTH OF April, 2021 – MEN SAINTS

Blessed Anacleto Gonzales Flores 1888-1927 (Feast Day- April 1)

Blessed Anacleto Flores was the second of twelve children born to a poor family in Jalisco, Mexico. He was baptized one day after his birth.

As he grew, a family friend who was a priest recognized his intelligence and recommended sending him to a minor

seminary. While there he studied diligently, excelled and earned the nickname of "Maestro" but he came to believe that he did not have a calling. Instead, he became a lawyer, a husband and a father of two children.

After leaving the seminary, Anacleto attended daily Mass, performed numerous charitable works including visiting prisoners, taught catechism and became a prolific writer. He joined the (ACJM) Catholic Association of Young Mexicans and became founder and president of Popular Union (UP), an organization of Catholics formed and committed to resisting persecution of the Catholic Church by dictator/atheist Plutarco Elias Calles.

Blessed Anacleto participated in nonviolent resistance until the murder of four members of ACJM in 1926. Even then, he did not join the Catholic army fighting Calles but wrote pamphlets and gave speeches in support of the Catholic Cristeros (army). In seeking to crush the rebellion, the government arrested and brutally tortured Anacleto before executing him by firing squad on April 1, 1927.

Anacleto Gonzales Flores was beatified by Pope Benedict XVI as a martyr on November 20, 2005.

Saint Herman Joseph 1150 - 1241 (Feast Day – April 7)

St. Herman was born in Cologne, Germany to a noble family who had lost their money. At a very early age, he was known for his devotion to the Blessed Virgin and for his tendencies toward mystical experiences. He could be found almost

daily at the church of St. Mary in the capitol of Cologne on his knees praying to Mary and the child, Jesus.

According to legend, he once presented an apple, saved from his own lunch, to a statue of the Virgin and child. He was too small to be able to reach high enough but Mary bent down so that the child, Jesus, could reach the fruit.

At age 12, St. Herman entered the abbey of the Norbertines but, as he was too young to be accepted into the Order, he was send to the Netherlands to study. Upon his return, he made his vows and was sent to perform pastoral duties and to make and repair clocks, an ability for which exhibited great talent.

St. Herman experienced visions of Jesus, Mary and Joseph and penned a number of mystical writings. He was humble and poor, patient and friendly to everyone. He was a model of obedience to his superiors. He wrote several hymns in honor of the Blessed Mother and St. Ursala and her Companions, all in a style full of feeling.

Later in life, he was appointed spiritual director to the Cistercian nuns with whom he had frequent contact. During the last Lent of his life, he was at the monastery of the Cistercians when he became gravely ill. He died the Thursday after Easter, April 4, 1241. His veneration began immediately after his death due to reports of numerous miracles at his tomb.

On August 11, 1958, his status as a saint of the Roman Catholic Church was formally recognized at Vatican City by Pope Pius XII.

St. Louis-Marie Grignion de Monfort 1673 - 1716

(Foast Day - April 38)

(Feast Day – April 28)

St. Louis was born in Monfort-sur-Meu, France, the eldest surviving child of eighteen. He spent most of his infancy and early childhood on a farm purchased by his father, a Notary. At the age of 12, he entered the Jesuit College of St. Thomas Becket where his uncle was a parish priest. Upon completion of his ordinary schooling, he began the study of theology and philosophy. He was inspired to preach missions among the poor after listening to the stories of a local priest about his life as a traveling missionary.

St. Louis was ordained a priest in 1700 at the age of 27, and for some time thereafter, fulfilled the duties of chaplain at a local hospital.

His years of ministering to the poor and living a simple life sometimes caused him problems with Church authorities. He was a gifted orator and his preaching attracted thousands back to the faith. Father Louis encouraged daily Holy Communion; not the custom during those times.

His whole life was conspicuous for virtues: constant prayer, love of the poor, poverty carried to an unbelievable degree and joy in humiliations and persecutions.

St. Louis founded two congregations:
Missionaries of the Company of Mary in
1715, for priests and brothers, and
Daughters of Wisdom in 1703, women who
cared for the sick. His book, "True
Devotion to the Blessed Virgin" has
become a classic for Marian devotion.

Worn out by hard work and accompanying illness, St. Louis died on April 28, 1716 at the age of 43.

Louis de Monfort was canonized by Pope Pius XIII in 1947 and is now being considered as a Doctor of the Church.
