As for being blessed...our speaker at the September 20th meeting was himself

blessed and in turn blessed us with a fascinating slide show and presentation for his 50 years of climbing including his three trips to and his ascent of Mount Everest. His description of his personal encounter of a near death experience was riveting and his recovery clear proof of his being blessed by God.

Remember that our District 6 Convention is being held Monday evening, October 14th and Tuesday, October 15th.

Archbishop Aquila will be the keynote speaker on Monday. I encourage any and all of you to attend!

Recent Past Events

Serra Club was blessed this month to experience two very diverse but amazing speakers.

September 6 – Club Meeting

Our first talk was presented by Maria Fullinwider whose passion for missionary work led her to Bacita, Nigeria to provide support for St. Brendan's Catholic Hospital.

Bacita is located within the African bush country and is populated by a Muslim majority. So much of the government in that part of the world is corrupt which makes opening, equipping and running a hospital a particularly difficult endeavor.

The initial cost to get the hospital up and running was \$100,000. While the hospital is still dirty and ill-equipped, the staff, consisting mostly of native nursing personnel, volunteers and, often, no doctor, manage to treat up to 300 people a day. People often travel on foot, sick or injured from as far away as 2 ½ miles to seek help. Malaria is a major problem and kills so many children in that part of the world that many parents arrive seeking help for their seriously ailing babies.

Since the hospital's establishment in 1979, hospital missionaries and volunteers have managed to complete the maternity ward, children's ward and chapel. The work is ongoing. Ms. Fallinwider appealed to Serrans for any financial help that they may be able to offer as she emphasized

that it is "incredible what these people do with nothing".

Serrans were also visited by Luke Hicks, FOCUS team leader for the University of Colorado campus who will be returning in November to give a speech to our members. He was present on the 6th to remind us to attend the annual FOCUS fundraiser, the St. Therese dinner, to be held on October 4th at Sacred Heart of Mary Catholic Church and to also receive a check in the amount of \$1000, Serra Club of Boulder County's donation to FOCUS' C.U. campus ministry.

Our third visitor was Fr. Warli Castro, our former parochial vicar from Sacred Heart of Jesus Church who is now pastor of Holy

Cross Catholic Church in Thornton. It's a very multifarious community consisting of not only Americans but Mexicans, Vietnamese, Africans and other ethnicities.

Since his arrival in Thornton, the church has increased its attendance from 1000 registered families to 2300 to 2500 people. Thus, there was an immediate need to remodel the current church and increase seating capacity from 300 to 600 souls. "Now," Fr. Warli stated, "I must pay for it."

He is holding a festival next weekend at the church and was visiting we Serrans in Boulder County in order to sell raffle tickets to a drawing. By the looks of things, Fr. Warli appeared to have made a very profitable trip to Boulder.



September 20 - Club Meeting

Our second principal speaker of the month, Glen Porzak, was introduced by

Stan Peterson as "the most devout and generous person he has ever met".

Mr. Porzak is a local practicing attorney, a Sacred Heart of Jesus parishioner and, for many many years, a dedicated mountain climber. According to Mr. Porzak, climbing is a "sport of moments", climbers "conquistadors of the useless" as climbing a mountain is to reach a place (the summit) just to look. Not to mention, the mortality rate is 10%. For Mr. Porzak, climbing for him was not just the camaraderie although that was a major attraction but the place where he has always felt closer to God.

Mount Everest, located in the Himalayas in Nepal, reaches just over 29,028 feet. Mr. Porzak who has climbed Everest three times, the first time in 1981, then again in 1989 and 1990, laughingly claims that he is "glad I climbed when I did as Everest is increasing in height ¼" a year". On Porzak's first climb, his group were the only climbers on the mountain. Nowadays, it's common to find 500 to 1000 people on the mountain during climbing season, many lacking the necessary experience and often ill-prepared.

To climb Everest, the climbing party must first travel to the Kingdom of Nepal, to the capital city of Kathmandu. The dominant religions found in Nepal are Hinduism in the lower regions and Buddhism in the upper regions although, according to Mr. Porzak, there was a Catholic church there.

Sherpas, people who migrated from Tibet and Mongolia 500 years ago, seem particularly well suited to the high

altitudes due to genetic adaptation and are renowned for their hardiness and expertise. However, they wait for the head Lama, after prayers and contemplation, to predict a climb to be either "good karma" or "bad" karma. If he predicts "bad karma", Sherpas will not go.

One of the worst dangers in climbing Everest is the Kumba ice fall, a glacier which lies at an altitude of 17,999 ft., not far above base camp. Ice falls are constantly moving, creating wide cravasses. They can only be crossed by laying ladders across them. Falling ice and avalanches present further danger in trying to navigate the ice fall. High winds and blizzard conditions increase already hazardous conditions.

On Porzak's successful climb to the summit, a storm ensued and the climbers, wisely as it turned out, made the decision to return to base camp at the 28,500 ft. level. The storm lasted 11 days, and then the sun came out. The trek back up took four days. It was 30 degrees below zero, with only 35% oxygen at 29,000 ft. Mr. Porzak said his feet and toes hurt from the lack of oxygen. But, he finally made it to the top of Mount Everest, the highest point on Earth.

Fourteen mountain peaks stand taller than 8,000 meters (26,247 feet). All fourteen eight thousanders are located in Nepal, India, Pakistan and China.

While Everest is the tallest, the most

While Everest is the tallest, the most dangerous is Annapurna, located in Nepal, and rising to 26,545 feet. Mr. Porzak tells us that every passionate mountain

climber's wish is to reach the summit of all fourteen of the tallest mountains in the world.
