January 3 – Club Meeting

Since the speaker for Boulder County Serra Club's January 3 meeting was Lisa C Kukura, JD from the Catholic Foundation, Father Mark gave a brief introduction on the benefits Sacred Heart of Jesus school receives from its association with the foundation.

Lisa, the gift planning director for the Catholic Foundation which was created in 1998 by Archbishop Chaput, is a wife, mother of four adult children, a graduate of West Virginia University and a lawyer. She came to Serra to talk with members regarding estate planning and gifts that they may plan to bequeath to their church

......gifts that will keep on giving "beyond your lifetime" (the theme and motto at the Catholic Foundation).

Lisa, while no longer practicing law, meets with individuals in order to help them with their estate planning goals such as providing for loved ones, reducing or eliminating probate costs, preparing for possible future incapacitation, ensuring that their chosen charitable organizations are gifted and, ultimately, providing them with peace of mind.


Lisa will not only inform as to estate plan options such as a will, trust, ect. but will facilitate the completion of estate documents and, when the time comes, the proper distribution of the estate.

Donors will be fully informed regarding types of gifts. Beneficiary designations are flexible and may be changed at any time.

Going through the Catholic Foundation which supports Catholic parishes, schools, seminaries and other charitable organizations will become a spiritual gift for your family and your community.

Serran Terry Gallagher also spoke briefly about the Sacred Heart of Jesus school as a beneficiary of the Catholic Foundation as well as the SHJ Foundation which has been in existence for 25 years. Both foundations support school scholarships as well as facility updates, ect.

SHJ school was built in 1900 with early enrollments of approximately 600 students. Nowadays, enrollment hovers at around 200 students. The school was initially staffed by BVMs, then Benedictines. Four Jesuit priests and four



Benedictine priests were fostered by SHJ school. That speaks well for Catholic school preparation.

January 17 – Club Meeting

Deacon Chris Considine, a transitional deacon from St. John Vianny Seminary, who is scheduled for ordination in May, 2020, was the Boulder County Serra Club speaker for the January 17 meeting and what a speaker he was!

Deacon Chris first wanted us to hear his story and how he arrived at his desire to be a priest and, then, how all Catholics are called on to "bring souls to heaven". He told us we all have stories and those stories begin and end with God.

Deacon Chris's family moved from Alaska (brrr!) where his older sister was born to Seattle, WA where Deacon Chris was born to Texas (very hot!) and, finally, to

Colorado where he ended up attending the University of Colorado. On the way he had been schooled at a Jesuit high school in Texas, a school that Deacon Chris felt "helped grow the person" and where he first gave thought to becoming a priest.

However, there were hurdles along the way. From high school through his first couple years of college, Deacon Chris just knew he wanted to date and get married. He loved the college life and learned to be a very accomplished skier.

Then, during the next year, he decided to attend an annual University of Colorado Christian retreat called the "Buffalo Wing". It was a great retreat filled with food, dancing, games and fun but also adoration and confessions. It was during his confession that Deacon (now Father) David Nix asked him if he had ever considered being a priest. He admitted that he had but that he felt he was too immature at that time to discern and that he had not "felt the alarm system in his heart" activate. But Deacon Chris started going to daily mass and confession every two weeks to a month and, soon, the waters calmed and peace came. He was ordained a transitional deacon on March 2, 2019.

Deacon Chris was asked about what he was most looking forward to as a priest. He promptly answered "confession". He related the story of a time he was in Rome and went to the church where Saint Francis Xavier was entombed. St. Francis had heard many many confessions in his lifetime and, as a result, his arm from his elbow to his hand was incorrupt. Five hundred years later, the flesh was still there. Deacon Chris said, "Saving souls will open heaven." He also shared that celibacy, poverty and chastity were not the most difficult to overcome but that obedience which is the most intimate part of self, "your will", was.

Deacon Chris shared many words of wisdom with us....all very quotable. He started with how human beings are going to save the world with our redemptive suffering. Our purpose here today is to bring a reconciliation with God back to mankind. Every human, although they may not realize it, wishes to close the finite gap between the person and the infinite God. Everything is tied up in the epic of salvation. Does God need us? No, but he wants us! Everybody who is baptized is part of the Church. All Catholics are called on to bring souls to Heaven!



Deacon Chris told us he has never felt more alive or more fulfilled since he started his journey to the priesthood. He said I "cannot express how happy I am". It shows Deacon Chris, it shows!
